



## **FOCAL LANDSCAPE INITIATIVE**



The Appalachian Mountains Joint Venture (AMJV) partnership is focused on preserving, managing, and restoring diverse, healthy forest habitats in the region to benefit not only birds, but the diversity of Appalachian plants and wildlife.

The Focal Landscape approach strategically targets capacity and resources to highpriority regions, maximizing conservation impacts and making concrete steps toward improving habitat for priority species.

The goal of this approach is to support our partners' ability to:

- Focus limited capacity and resources in strategic locations, working across public and private lands.
- Enhance the diversity and health of habitat in the landscape using a holistic approach that considers the entire system, versus individual species or habitat types, over a long time-span (e.g. 10-20+ years).
- Integrate forest restoration efforts with bird conservation objectives.
- Enhance forest health and structure to benefit a diversity of wildlife.

## **KEY ISSUES AND PRIORITIES**

Work within this focal landscape will focus on addressing a number of key issues and threats:

- · Decreased forest structural and age-class diversity
- Lack of prescribed fire
- Invasive species/pests/pathogens
- · Loss of habitat connectivity
- Decreased water quality


Priority habitats and species for this work include:

<u>Open Habitats</u> - grasslands, shale barrens, limestone/dolomite glades, shrublands (old fields)

Species: Northern Bobwhite, Golden-winged Warbler, Peregrine Falcon, Loggerhead Shrike, Northern Harrier, Mountain Earthsnake, Monarch Butterfly, Rusty Patch Bumblebee

<u>Forests</u> - High elevation Northern hardwoods/spruce, open woodlands, oak-hickory, pitch/table mountain pine/shortleaf

Species: Golden Eagle (Wintering), Cerulean Warbler, Wood Thrush, Canada Warbler, Blackbilled Cuckoo, American Woodcock, Northern Saw-whet Owl, Ruffed Grouse, Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Eastern Whip-poor-will, Red Crossbill, Kentucky Warbler, Timber Rattlesnake, Rusty Patch Bumblebee, Southern Rock Vole, Allegheny woodrat, Eastern spotted skunk, Fisher, Hibernating bats, Summer roosting bats
